



- digitalization of the Roll of Honour in order to make it interactive and to access information about the names

















# CONCEPTS

- digitalization of the Roll of Honour in order to make it interactive and to access information about the names

As a tour guide, I knew that the School had existed during the war but I had no knowledge of the School's involvement if any at all. I then found on the Internet a photo of the Roll of Honour, something I had not noticed in the Mackintosh building. I asked around and it seemed like not many students were aware of this memorial. I did some more Internet searches but decided to go to the Library and the Archives for more information about the Roll and the names on it.







### LIBRARY

I made an appointment with the Library to have a look at their rare books related to the theme of militaria.

I looked at Crests and Badges of the British Army in Daily Use as well as Official Medals and Ribbons of the British Army.

The collection that interested me the most however was The Western Front: a series of booklets with drawings by Muirhead Bone and comments by General Sir Douglas Haig. Bone was born in Glasgow and commissionned as a war artist. These drawings provided me with an insight into the war from a different perspective: from art's point of view.













In the Glasgow School of Art Archives I found:


- records and artefacts since it's foundation in 1845

The next page shows 3 examples of stories. The first one is on the basement floor in the Furniture Gallery. There is information about the chairs including the Willow waitress settle that was featured in Inception.

The next is on the Groud Floor where the School's Roll of Honour is hidden away. Here there is access to names on the roll, in this case Eugene Bourdon, an architecture teacher who died at the Somme.

The third story is on the First Floor in the Mackintosh Museum. The Degree show archives can be accessed here as well as a link to the current 2013 show and the Arches after party event on Facebook.





















































# VIDEO PROTOTYPF






# TOUR APP 2 edited


After our presentations, I changed some of the final concept based on the feedback I had gotten.

I changed the logo of the app: it is a zoomed in snapshot of an "M" as well as the map of the ground floor. In this design I wanted to emphasize that the building is disovered on a map basis and highlight the map as a key feature in the app.

I also added the interface pages that the user can see when they click the "..." (more) button. There are provided links to the Archives blog, their flickr, the School's flickr as well as the Hunterian. Finally there is also the possibility to set up an appointment with the Archives.



# EXPANDING

The app is in its majority images. For further information large paragraphs of text can be added to the app in the form of PDF documents. The app also has the potential to be updated, like other apps: constantly adding new information for users. The app also has potential to link to youtube videos of experts and curators giving more information about the School. Therefore the visitor can sit down and listen or listen as they walk around. This once again highlights the freedom for this app centered tour.



### REFLECTION

In this last project we reflected on the upcoming centenary of the start of the First World War.

Originally looking at survivors, I discovered that the Glasgow School of Art had had a more important role in the war than I had imagined. There is evidence of this in the School with the Roll of Honour (that no one notices) and the Archives (which few people visit). Because of this lack of communication of information I wanted to create an app that would allow students as well as visitors to uncover the rich history of the School. After created a predominantely WW1 app, I saw the potential for sharing even more information about the School and various facts that new students like me do not yet know about.

Overall I wanted the project to inspire students to be more involved with the School, all in their own time. In the end the project became overwhelming because of the vast amount of information there is about the School.

Therefore I set up a "more" option which links the user to more sources of information like blogs, flickr, and online archives.

I found it valuable to look at the war from a different angle: from the Glasgow School of Art's perspective.
